Dunkard Church

Levi Huffstetter--first house on left as turn on #150.

Lady at the Fout's place said come to next road at turn--went
on through woods be on a trail--turn at second for Hancock's Chapel.
This road ran on due east from second house. Old road comes in at
first turn south. Old road from east shortly after turning south on
Hancock Chapel Road is *Lightning Bug Road.*

Cemetery List of Mrs. Marks compiled in the 1930's and placed in the Salem, IN Library. West Side Dunkard is the name given by Mrs. Marks because of its location on the western edge of Harrison County. The early county plat map referred to it as the Huffstutter Cemetery. The land belonged to Lewis Huffstutter and was the site of Shady Grove Church of the Dunkards or German Brethren.

After Mrs. Marks compiled her list, a farmer removed all of the tombstones stacking them against a fence and then plowed over the graves leaving only one stone standing.
