

His wife Mary was b. in 1704. Jan. 3, 1733, he received a warrant for 150 acres, and Apr. 11, 1744, a warrant for 200 acres, both in Lancaster Co., Pa. His lands were in Warwick and Cocalico Tps. He patented land in 1749. From the settlement of his estate and from the list of his fam. furnished by the ship captain on his arrival, it appears that his children were, Barbara, b. 1722, d. before her father, and m. Samuel Singer, and had one son John; John, b. 1722, his wife's name was Barbara; Anna, b. 1726, m. John Mayer; Veronica or Franzy, b. 1729, m. Abraham Herr. His son John and wife Barbara, Nov. 5, 1766, deeded land in Cocalico Tp. to Michael Huben.

9046, Jacob Hochstetter arrived at Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 9, 1738. On the list of the ship captain his name is given as Jacob Hostedler, and his age as 26.

July 10, 1741, a warrant for 475 acres of land in Lancaster Co., Pa., was given to Jacob Hochtater, Jr.

9047, Ulrich Hohsteter arrived at Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 11, 1749, on the ship Priscilla. It is reported that he fought under Braddock and later returned to the old country. He came to America again and fought during the Revolutionary War. After the war he lived for a time in Maryland and later settled in Bourbon Co., Ky., where he d. The name of his first wife is unknown. She is reported to have borne him three sons. Matthew; James; John. His second wife was Miss Baxter, of the celebrated Kentucky family of that name. 9050, David Huffstetter, 9048, m. in 1831, (2) Polly Ann Bower of Washington Co., Ind. Washington Bower d. at 16; Dau. d. in infancy; David J., 9051; Andrew J., 9053.

9051, David Jefferson Huffstetter, 9049, was b. in 1837 and d. in 1884, and m. Mary Ellen Campbell. Harry C., 9052; Jennie Bower, d. at 10 yrs.

9052, Harry C. Huffstetter, 9050, Indianapolis, Ind., m. Nancy J. Riley, of Bedford, Ind. He has furnished most of the information given of this family.

9053, Andrew J. Huffstetter, 9049, m. (1) Lou A. Kern and (2) Margaret E. Woodward.

9054, Ruth Huffstedter, 9047, was b. May 29, 1783, d. June 17, 1853 in Ind., and m. John Hon who was b. Nov. 15, 1781, in Nicholas Co., Ky., and d. in 1863, in Ind., the son of Jonas Hon of fam. 9055, and Mary Keithley. Their children were all b. in Nicholas Co., Ky., except the youngest. Mary B., Oct.

9046. John Hostetter, Freeman, appears on tax list of Lebanon Tp., Lancaster Co., Pa., in 1782, taxed 4 f. Pa. Arch. Ser. 3, Vol. 17, p. 806. If not the son of Oswald Hostetter of fam. 9045, he may be a son of Jacob, the immigrant of 1738.

9047. This may be the Ulerich Hoffstotler who is taxed in 1788, in Tyrone Tp., Huntingdon Co., Pa. In the same year, in Frankstown Tp., in the same county, appear the names of James Hoofstotler and Matthew Hufstotler, a single freeman. The federal census of 1790, locates James Huffstotter in Huntingdon Co., Pa. Wolrick and James Huffstater appear on the roll of the Rangers of the Frontier in Bedford Co., Pa., 1778-83. The federal census of 1790 reports Olesy Hofstaker in Washington Co., Pa.

12, 1804—Nov. 22, 1853, m. in 1822, Solomon Sears who was b. Jan. 10, 1801, and their children were Angeline, Lucinda and Lucetta; Ulrich Huffstutter, 1806—; Jonas, Nov. 7, 1808—July 17, 1849; George, Jan. 12, 1811—; John, June 1, 1813—Aug. 13, 1841; Matthew M., June 20, 1815—May 28, 1882, see fam. 7929; Peter, May 26, 1823—May 13, 1865.

9055, Jonas Hon, of Nicholas Co., Ky., at death, came from Germany to America and lived for a time in Pa. He had a brother Joseph who served in the Revolutionary War. Jonas m. Mary Keithley. John, of fam. 9054; Elizabeth, 9056; Jacob, 9057; Daniel, 9058; Katie, 9059; Peter, 9060.

9056, Elizabeth Hon, 9055, m. John Sears. Jonas; John; Henry; Levi; Absalom; Kittie; Ruth.

9057, Jacob Hon, 9055, had children, Daniel; Jonas; John; Jackson; Mary; Sarah; Catherine; Melinda.

9058, Daniel Honn, 9055, married (1) Sarah Blount who with a son and a dau. died at nearly the same time, of the flux. He m. (2) about 1811, Anna Eberman. Hezekiah, d. about 1839; Peter; Andrew, d. about 1837; Samuel; William; Absalom, see fam. 8405; Daniel; Martha; Elizabeth.

9059, Katie Hon, 9055, married George Sears, a brother of John Sears, husband of her sister Elizabeth. See fam. 9056. She was b. Mar. 10, 1789, and d. Sept. 23, 1880. George Sears was b. Mar. 5, 1789, and d. Sept. 20, 1857.

9060, Peter Hon, 9055, was b. Oct. 10, 1791, and m. Feb. 28, 1808, Elizabeth Clark who was b. Dec. 25, 1788. He was well and widely known as a preacher and evangelist of unusual power. Polly, Feb. 20, 1809—, of fam. 8106; Ezra, Jan. 22, 1811—; Lucinda, Aug. 8, 1812—; Levi, Mar. 31, 1814—; Prudence, Oct. 22, 1815—; Ann, Oct. 23, 1817—; John V., Oct. 27, 1819—; Eliza J., Sept. 6, 1821—; Adam H., Sept. 19, 1823—; Elizabeth, Mar. 4, 1826—; Daniel K., Feb. 6, 1829—; Lucetta, Dec. 29, 1839—.

9061, Christian Hochstaetter arrived in Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 15, 1749, in ship Phoenix. Capt. John Mason reported his passengers as from Zweibruecken, Nassau, Württemberg and the Palatinate. It is believed by the descendants of Ulrich Hostetter, who arrived on the same ship, that Christian Ulrich and Nicholas were brothers, from Glaurus, Canton Glaurus, Switzerland. It is likely that this is the Christian Hostetter who appears on the tax lists of Huntington Tp., York Co., Pa., during the years 1779-83. He was taxed on 100 acres of land, and in 1783, his family is credited with 4 inhabitants. Pa. Archives, Series 3, Vol. 21.

A warrant was given June 3, 1813, to Christian Hostetter, for 204 acres of land in Cumberland Co., Pa. Pa. Archives, Ser. 3, Vol. 24, p. 964. Samuel, 9062; Daniel, 9077.

9062, Samuel Hostetter, 9061, d. near Uniontown, Pa., Oct. 27, 1856, aged

9061. The above brothers Samuel and Daniel are assigned to this fam. as the descendants of each have traditions that their father was one of three brothers who came to America at the same time. These traditions declare that the father of Samuel and Daniel lived to a great age, over 105 years.

9062. The federal census of 1790, has in Fayette Co., Georges Tp., the family of Samuel Howsteeter, with 2 free white males under 16 yrs., and 3 white females. In the same county, Menallen Tp., appears the family of Samuel Howstatler, with 1 free white male under 16 yrs., and 4 free white females. The tax lists of Menallen Tp. from 1785 to 1801 show Samuel Hostater in 1793 and 1795. He had no land, and was taxed on 1 horse and 2 cows. The lists of Georges Tp., from 1787 to 1799 show Samuel Hosteeter in 1788, taxed on 1 horse and 1 cow.
